Freetown selectmen 'walk the bounds'

FREETOWN — Selectmen Lawrence N. Ashley and Lisa A. Pacheco stood in the middle of a wooded path yesterday near Little Quittacas Pond while Selectman John S. Ashley patrolled through the woods looking for a stone boundary marker delineating the town line.

After what seemed to be an hour of waiting, filled with goodnatured ribbing between Lawrence Ashley and the "junior selectman" Ms. Pacheco, the party finally found the boundary marker approximately 300 feet from Little Quittacas Pond.

As per her "junior selectman" status, Ms. Pacheco marked "06" in black marker on the Freetown side of the boundary post to indicate the year the selectmen verified the town's boundaries.

"Next time, you gotta go in with the GPS, this way you can just walk right up to the marker," said John Ashley, referring to the global positioning satellite sys-


The selectmen had a much easier time locating boundary markers on Keene Road, Route 105 and County Road.

NEW BEDFORD — Grown men sobbed, women leaned on each other and young children blinked back tears while Louis Armstrong's


voice softly sang: "And I think to myself, it's a wonderful world."

Artists coming to 123 Sawtooth

Creative community grows in lofts

into the condominium owned by Daniel Kamman and Frani Keeley through huge sawtooth skylight windows. With hardwood floors, painted brick and high ceilings, it is the quintessential artists liveand-work space.

"It's a wonderful feeling to be in here," said Mr. Kamman, previously of Cambridge. "I like being able to see all our living space and working space at the same time. It feels like being outside, in a way."

Mr. Kamman makes jewelry out of industrial parts. Ms. Keeley, a Fall River native, paints on small

In most real estate transactions, their art would not have entered

into the picture.

But at the former Ropeworks NEW BEDFORD — Light pours Building, now called 123 Sawtooth, art is a prerequisite. The couple had to prove that they were working artists, and that they would be using their new condominium to live and to work.

'It's wonderful to be in a community of artists," Mr. Kamman said, "to know that the other people here speak my language.

When engaged couple Anne Wolfe and Adam Buck, along with Adam's father, Norman R. Buck, bought the former Ropeworks Building in 2004, they envisioned creating an artist community that could not be displaced by gentrification. All potential customers have to show their art portfolio before they are allowed to purchase a unit, and there is a caveat in the condominium deed that stipulates that the unit must be owned by a working artist.

"In so many areas, the developer comes in and the artists are priced out," Ms. Wolfe said. "We wanted to keep this as a permanent artists' community.

So far, four of the 11 units are sold. In addition to Mr. Kamman and Ms. Keeley, the units have been sold to a young couple from Tiverton who design jewelry and See **LOFTS** A5
